# How the Chi O chapter house came to be

As part of Northwestern's Sesquicentennial in 2000-2001, a "Brief History of 1870 Orrington Avenue" was published at www.nu150.northwestern.edu. Excerpts are reprinted here by permission of Northwestern.

Prior to the 1920s, Northwestern University offered its female students few housing options. Most women lived in the "old Willard Hall" dormitory (now the Music Administration Building), in boarding houses or private homes in Evanston.

In the early 1920s Northwestern's sororities enthusiastically embraced a movement to create a women's housing quadrangle. Each sorority agreed to raise one quarter of the total construction cost (about \$60,000 per house) to create 14 sorority houses bounded by Emerson Street, University Place, Sheridan Road, and Sherman Avenue. In 1924 the North Shore Chi Omega Association was formed to act as the chapter's House Board that would manage the maintenance, operation, and upkeep of the house. By 1926 the sorority's fundraising efforts-including food and rummage sales, bazaars, and sales of cook books, hand-tinted Chi Omega "Symphony" cards, and Christmas cards-raised more than \$21,000.

The University's architect James Gamble Rogers designed all of the buildings in the residential quadrangle with the exception of North and South Mid Quads, which were added in 1981. Mr. Rogers also designed Dyche Stadium (1926), now called Ryan Field, Deering Library (1932) and Scott Hall (1938).

Each of the buildings in the women's quadrangle exemplify Rogers' eclectic



"Collegiate Gothic" style that included picturesque composition and steeply pitched roofs. Constructed with Lannon-Wisconsin limestone with Bedford stone trim and a slate roof, the 24-plus room Chi Omega house was completed scribed by alumnae as "home-like, harmonious, and substantial, rather than extravagant." In the early 1930s, the living room was featured in Better Homes and Gardens "to show how charmingly Early American furniture can make a home." ...

Private phones in students' rooms replaced hallway pay phones in the 1970s. In the mid-1990s, Internet ports were added to each room to provide high-speed Internet access comparable to that of the University's residence halls. ....

The living room features ornate plasterwork on the ceiling. The 3 layers of borders (ivy, egg and dart, and standard dentil molding) create an elaborate effect. The dentil molding border was repeated in the wooden mantel piece—added about 30 years ago—that surrounds the fireplace. ...

In 1966 the fourth floor attic was converted into one triple and three double occupancy sleeping rooms that expanded the capacity of the house from 27 to 35. The second and third floors have 2 triple-occupancy rooms, 8 double rooms and 6 singles. ...

The Collegiate Gothic architectural styling linked Northwestern to the European educational tradition and to the well-established east-coast institutions of higher learning....

The house was first furnished for about \$10,000 in 1927. The furnishings were de-

dads) are not allowed on the sleeping floors of the sorority house except on special occasions like move-in day. Sorority members are not allowed to have alcohol in the house at any time. Restrictions such as these contribute to the secure and wholesome living experience that sororities offer.

# When the students become the teachers

Not so long ago, Varshini Cherukupalli, '11, was roaming the halls of 1870 Orrington Avenue in a Chi O Tshirt.

These days, she's in a white lab coat, roaming the halls of Northwestern's Medical School—or, if it's summer, she's in India helping rural villagers.

Varshini travels there to work with Project RISHI, which stands for Rural India Social and Health Improvement. It's a non-profit organization whose mission is to promote the sustainable development and growth of rural Indian communities. The group addresses the developmental disparities fed by the cycle of poverty and educates and empowers the residents to overcome them.

Northwestern's chapter is one of 10 in the U.S. and was founded in 2011 by a group of students including two Xi Chapter Chi Omegas, Varshini and Manisha Bhatia, '09. Though Varshini and Manisha have graduated from NU undergrad, Project RISHI goes on at Northwestern.

I recently sat down with Varshini, who is in her second year of medical school, to hear more about her experiences. She's still involved with Project RISHI, and last summer she traveled once again to the community she's been helping, her fifth time there.

Q: You've said that if it weren't for Chi Omega, Project RISHI wouldn't exist at Northwestern. Could you elaborate?

A: During my freshman year at Northwestern, Manisha and I had attended a global health talk and were particularly inspired to "do something." It was Founder's Day (2011), and as we walked back to the house for pizza and cake, we talked about how we should try to start a global health project in India. I had heard of Project RISHI from my friends at other Project RISHI chapters, and I suggested starting a chapter at Northwestern. Manisha and I worked together to establish the chapter with our peers.

Without Chi O. I would not have met her!

**Q**: What's the name of the community vou help in India and what's it like there? A: Our partner community is called Charnia, located in Nanakpur, Haryana — a rural area that sits right at the foot of the Himalayas. Nanakpur's population consists of primarily migrant brick laborers and farmers, most of whom struggle to maintain stable access to health care. As of now, I have been to Nanakpur five times, and each time, I learn something new about the people living there. That's why I find it challenging to describe the community in just a few words — each individual I have met so far is so unique. Overall, the population has varying levels of literacy, but more educational and health disparities are evident in the brick laborer population. Those are the deficiencies RISHI attempts to target.

Q: How long do you stay there and what specifically do you do?

A: Our Project RISHI trips usually

last 2-3 weeks. Over the past few years, we have established partnerships with physicians at the local health centers and hospitals, and they have been an essential part of our projects. In 2012, we completed around 200 household surveys to understand the needs of the community. Then we conducted research on anemia and malnutrition, and we worked with the government community health workers to improve distribution of iron/folic-acid supplementation. Currently, our RISHI members are focusing on improving access to sanitary pads with the support of the community health workers (who are amazing). We also hold annual health camps, and we recently opened a small clinic in Nanakpur.

This past summer, Manisha and I were interested in looking at the surgical needs of the Nanakpur population, as well as the broader systemic barriers in accessing surgical care. Traditionally, surgery has not been a major focus of global health. But the need for surgical care in low- and middle-income coun-

tries is becoming more pronounced.

Since Nanakpur has many individuals who work as laborers and are thus susceptible to injuries, we hoped to characterize access to surgical care in the community. We used a tool called SOSAS (Surgeons Overseas Assessment of Surgical Need) to conduct villager surveys in Nanakpur, and we also conducted a survey called PIPES (Personnel, Infrastructure, Procedures, Equipment, and Supplies) at local health centers to understand their trauma and surgical care capacities. Next summer, we plan to go back to Nanakpur to follow up on our research and conduct first responder courses in Nanakpur.

Q: What's your favorite memory from your travels to India with Project RISHI?

A: It's so hard to pick one! I would say our first health camp is one of my favorite experiences. We had requested physicians of different specialties to participate, and we had medicines ready for distribution. We thought we had everything prepared, but we did not expect over 200 people to show up. Long story short, it was a day of organized chaos, but we somehow survived. Also, crashing a wedding, doing group Insanity workouts, and going to as many restaurants as possible in Chandigarh (the nearby city) are definitely at the top of my list.

Q: How has your experience with Project RISHI affected your perspective about the world?

A: I have realized that you can form incredibly meaningful relationships with people who have completely different life experiences and cultures. It's all about understanding what their stories are. Even though I didn't know of its existence six years ago, Nanakpur now feels like a second home to me.

That is solely because of the people who live there, who have welcomed me and shared their stories with me. Because of Project RISHI, I have come to understand that we all have so much to learn from each other. You just have to start the conversation.

# Survey of Greek donors studies Chi Omegas' giving

ast year, Chi Omegas from across the nation joined other Greek participants in the largest study of fraternal donor behavior in the country.

More than 67,000 donors and alumni from 19 women's fraternities/sororities and 19 men's fraternities took the online survey; 3,500 of them represented Chi Omega.

Highlights of the survey, which was conducted by Cygnus Applied Research in May and June, will appear in upcoming issues of The Eleusis. Here are some of the findings:

- Chi Omega had higher 2014 average donation value and alumnae participation compared to other sororities and Greek foundations.
- Chi Omega's revenue growth soared above other fraternal organizations, almost exclusively driven by alumnae who made new donations at or above \$10,000. Many of these gifts were made in support of our Sisterhood Never Stops Campaign.
- Chi Omega has the largest women's fraternity alumnae population with current addresses: 239,855.

"Taken as a whole, the survey shows Chi Omegas living our values with loyalty to our Fraternity," Chi Omega Foundation President **Jane Rogers** said in a letter to participants. And there is tremendous opportunity for further engagement, she said

To that end, the foundation will be working to create a deeper understanding of the importance of annual giving and of the foundation's activities and how donors' contributions are put to work. The foundation also will strive to build a better sense of connection among Chi Omega alumnae.

The Chi Omega Foundation provides philanthropic support for the fraternity, ensuring that the educational and leadership development needs of its collegians and alumnae are met. More than 8,800 donors each year enable the foundation to offer grants for an impressive array of life-changing educational and developmental opportunities.
